Policies and Procedures

Alcohol / Drug Use: The Bend Metro Park and Recreation District is a drug free work place. Alcohol and drugs are strictly prohibited while on duty. "On duty" is anytime that staff is responsible for the safety of participants and decision making in program.

Computer use: There will be a computer at the district office available for interns to use. This computer is only to be used for work or school projects. The intern house has a computer, wireless internet, and the public library has internet access.

Confidentiality: Any information obtained about BMPRD's Special Recreation participants is to remain confidential. Interns can take pictures of the participants only with the permission of the participant or the parent.

Dress Code: Whenever not at program sites or events, the dress is business casual (more casual on Fridays) however, when out in program, dress should be appropriate to the activity.

Training: Interns are required to attend BMPRD's general training, driver training, and the Special Recreation training. All other policies and procedures will be addressed at that time.

Smoking: Smoking is prohibited in front of participants, in company vehicles, and on any BMPRD property, including on intern house property.

Program Area Opportunities

Sports: We provide sport programs where the participants have fun, improve their skills, become better people and want to play again next year. Some of the offerings in our Sports Department include: Soccer, Baseball, Basketball, various Sports Camps, Volleyball, Lacrosse, Tennis, Golf, Football and Fishing.

Juniper Swim & Fitness Center: Committed to providing high quality swim and fitness opportunities for people of all ages, interests and abilities. Some of the offerings at JSFC include: Recreation Swim, Swim Lessons, Aqua Camp, Busy Buddies Club, Kids Corner (child care), Triathlon Training, Arthritis Exercise Classes, Weight Room & Fitness Center, Group Exercise, Martial Arts, Yoga, Prenatal Exercise and more.

Senior Center: A gathering place for persons 50 years and older promoting active healthy lifestyles. The Senior Center works closely with a variety of community partnerships. It also offers: Travel Programs, Dance Classes, Special Events and a variety of Fitness Classes.

Recreation/Enrichment: This program area includes Youth Recreation, Special Events, Youth and Adult Enrichment, Special Recreation, Youth and Adult Outdoor, and Volunteer Programs. Programs include structured, high quality enrichment and recreation classes for participants from 3 months through seniors as well as drop-in special events and activities for the entire community. Some offerings in our Recreation/Enrichment Department include: Preschool Enrichment Classes & Day Camps; Before & After School Care; Youth Enrichment, such as Art Classes, Music Classes & Day Camps; Adult Enrichment, such as Wine Tasting and Parenting Classes; Activities for Youth & Adults with disabilities; Youth Outdoor activities such as Rafting, Rock Climbing & Mountain Biking; Adult Outdoor Activities such as Hiking, Canoeing, and Snow Shoeing; Youth Volunteer Corps; and two large special events - An Old Fashioned July 4th Celebration & Pet Parade and the Original Central Oregon Pumpkin Festival.

Inclusive Programs: All of BMRPD's general recreation programs are inclusive. No one will be turned away as long as the person's involvement does not change the nature of the program. BMRPD strives to make respectful and safe accommodations for everyone who wishes to participate in any program. Internship Structure

Bend Metro Park and Recreation District is committed to providing students with practical learning experiences under the direct supervision of a nationally certified therapeutic recreation specialist. These field experiences help the student apply their classroom knowledge to a professional setting while being supported by the agency's CTRS.

Goals of internship:

1. Provide intern with hands on experience in several recreation programs - both inclusive and specialized. The intern will be exposed to adaptive equipment, behavior management techniques, and site evaluation techniques.
2. Provide exposure to a wide range of physical and intellectual disabilities, and learn how to respectfully include these participants in recreation programs.
3. Provide intern with professional opportunities to participate in all aspects of the therapeutic process, including: assessment, planning, implementation, evaluation, and further documentation.
4. With the help of a CTRS, the intern will ease into all aspects of leading a recreation program, such as: site evaluation, risk management, behavior management, and documentation.
5. Provide intern with the opportunity to observe and assist with other areas of program planning and administration, including but not limited to: program development, marketing, fundraising, budgeting, public relations, community advocacy, registration, special events, and equipment and facility maintenance.
6. Prepare intern for NCTRC exam.
7. Provide intern with HOUSING and \$200/month stipend or no housing and \$400/month stipend.
8. Provide intern with a support system that allows each intern to learn, grow professionally, and have a great time!
9. Have FUN!

Intern Job Description

The intern will have several different roles in the organization. He/She will be expected to assist with all aspects of recreation programming while being supervised by a Nationally Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist. Intern will be expected to participate in special events such as the 4th of July Festival or the Pumpkin Festival in October.

The intern will also train other staff members on disability awareness. Through projects, research, or presentations the intern will educate others on therapeutic recreation current trends and issues.

Pre-internship responsibilities

1. Respond to internship offer with acceptance email or letter.
 - Please include beginning date and ending date
 - A statement of requirements and expectations (goals, curriculum needs, what you are looking forward to, etc.)
2. Arrange for housing in Bend (we will provide housing or you can get your own)
3. Have a current CPR and 1st Aid Certification. Make sure you bring your cards to Bend. If you are not currently certified please let us know and we will arrange certification upon your arrival.
4. Identification requirements: Bring with you your passport OR 2 pieces of Identification - a government issued photo ID (ex. Driver's license, Military ID, Student ID) AND your ORIGINAL Social Security Card or ORIGINAL government issued birth certificate.

During the Internship

1. Attend BMPRD's general training, driver training, and Special Recreation's training.
2. Attend weekly intern meetings.
3. Participate in all special recreation programs and inclusive programs as directed by supervisor.
4. Maintain intern binder. Including but not limited to: all training manuals, blank assessment forms, progress notes, evaluations, mileage sheets, site evaluations, incident/accident forms, calendars, budget work sheets, and program guides.
5. Complete assignments and special projects as directed by supervisor.
6. Participate in special events.
7. Participate in all aspects of programming, including program planning, budget planning, progress notes, and driving District vehicles.
8. Participate in internship and intern program evaluation.

Internship Timeline

Internship Experience: A minimum of 14 weeks. The intern will work 40 hours per week in an average of 5 days a week, usually with Sunday and Monday off. Practicum experiences are 8-10 weeks averaging about 40 hours per week. Special considerations may be made with advanced notice or in emergency situations.

Example summer timeline; tentative depending on program registration and needs.

Week 1: Welcome! BMPRD's general training. Town & Facility orientation. Meet with supervisors to discuss goals and schedule.

Week 2-3: Continue special recreation training. Begin summer program preparation including site evaluations and calendars. Observe adult programs. Plan for over-night trips. Get EVERYTHING ready for summer programs. Weekly meetings begin. Special projects assigned.

Week 4-13: Summer programs begin. Continue training work on special projects. NCTRC Prep (including application). Observe and participate in inclusive programs. Slow transition into leadership role.

Week 7: Mid-term evaluations.

Week 14: Participant evaluations, programs evaluations, & program wrap-up. Final project due. Budgeting work-shop. Program planning work-shop.

Preparation for NCTRC Certification Exam

Interns will be given a chance to experience all aspects of Therapeutic Recreation.

Interns will perform the following tasks:

- Identify agency mission, goals, service plan, and population served.
- Review participant assessment and obtain any pertinent information from the participant, the participant's parents, and /or the participant's caregivers. Record information as needed or instructed by supervisor.
- Plan and assess activities and locations to fit participants' needs and abilities.
- Implement TR services.
- Set goals and objectives, take progress notes, monitor and adjust program accordingly.
- Evaluate participants, program, & staff.
- Send evaluations to participants and parents.
- Use participant/parent evaluations, budget evaluation, and site evaluations to help plan for the next summer.

Special Projects

Special projects will be determined by agency's needs and intern's skills and interests.

Things to Know

Housing: Housing is provided to interns if it has been pre-arranged and there is space available. The house has 2 bedrooms and 1 bath; however interns may have to share a room. All essentials will be provided including a well supplied kitchen and bathroom, washer/dryer. If the intern is not interested in staying in the house provided he/she is more than welcome to secure and pay for their own housing.

*Note - Only interns can stay in the intern house provided by Bend Metro Park & Recreation District.

Stipend: A stipend of \$200 a month will be provided, however if an intern does not stay in the District intern house, the stipend will be \$400 a month. This is subject to change depending upon the BMPRD yearly budget; please contact the Therapeutic Recreation Department for more information.

Transportation: It is the intern's responsibility to secure their transportation to and from programs. Most locations including the office are accessible by bike. The internship coordinator will help with transportation whenever possible, but do not count on her as your only means to get around town.

Directions to main office: The main office is located at 200 NW Pacific Park Lane. From 97 South out of Redmond take business 97 (3rd street), turn right on Olney. Go through 2 stop lights to Pacific Park Lane and turn left. (If you go over a bridge you have gone too far.)

If you are coming from Idaho on highway 20, turn right onto 3rd street (highway 97). Go to Olney and take a left. Go through 2 stop lights, and then take a left on Pacific Park Lane. (If you go over the bridge you have gone too far.) The BMPRD office is at the end of the road.

Special Recreation Programs

All Seasons:

Get Fit serves 8-12 adults with disabilities.

The primary focus of this program is physical fitness.

Hike on nearby trails, swim in the pool, and exercise at the gym.

Saturday Club serves 15-20 adults with disabilities.

This program is primarily a social program.

Attend community events, expand fitness and social skills.

Special Rec Service Club serves 10-15 adults with disabilities.

The focus of this program is giving back to the community.

Clean up parks, work with animal rescues, assist at community events, etc.

Seasonal Dances serves up to 30 adults with disabilities.

A social program, focusing on fun!

Eat dinner and dance the night away!

Fall/Winter/Spring:

Hang Time serves 9-13 adults with disabilities.

Focus on creativity, socialization, and motor skills.

Make crafts, listen to music, and go to community events such as the Farmers' Market.

Down Home Cookin' serves 15-20 adults with disabilities.

Promote healthy eating habits and proper food preparation and storage.

Oregon Coast Trip (Fall) serves 10-14 adults with disabilities.

A one night trip to the beautiful Oregon Coast!

Adaptive Skiing (Winter) serves adults and kids with disabilities.

Life Skills Field Trips serves school-aged kids within the local school district.

Take kids in life skills programs on field trips in the community.

Promote including all kids in the community, social interaction, motor skills, and more.

Summer:

EXCEL and GRO serves 8-12 children with disabilities (GRO ages 6-12; EXCEL ages 13-21).

These programs focus on motor and social skills, along with life skills and behavior management.

BendABLE Bunch serves 12-25 adults with disabilities.

Program helps develop appropriate social skills, work on fitness, and emphasize safety.

Participate in community events, such as concert in the park, going on picnics, taking hikes, and swimming at the community pool.

Overnight Camping Trips serves 10-24 adults with disabilities.

Currently offer 2 overnight trips in the summer. One is a single night trip to a local park; the other is the annual campout which is 2 nights at a location further away.

Adaptive Recreation serves adults with physical disabilities.

Adaptive golf, swimming, biking, horseback riding, canoeing, climbing, rafting, hiking, camping, etc.

Rafting trips are inclusive, with several throughout the summer.

Participants with and without disabilities enjoy up to class 2 rapids, water fights, and swimming.
